



Undergraduate Visiting or Non-Degree Status Application Instructions

Please note: students educated outside of the United States CANNOT apply as a visiting or non-degree student at John Jay College.

1. Attach a personal check or money order in the amount of \$65 made payable to: John Jay College. This payment covers the required non-refundable application fee.
2. Submit original copy of high school diploma or general equivalency diploma and test scores with this application.
3. For every institution attended above high school level, you must present a student copy of your transcript. This includes any academy/training transcripts as well as Advanced Placement (AP) scores and College Now credit taken while in high school. Non-degree students must have a cumulative grade point average of at least a 2.00 or better as established for matriculated students. Admissions criteria may change from semester to semester.
4. Application for admissions will not be considered unless all application procedures listed above have been completed.

Important: This application should be used only if you plan on attending John Jay College on a visiting or non-degree basis. **Financial Aid is not available for non-degree students. Non-degree tuition is higher than tuition for matriculated students.** For tuition and fee information visit:

Senior Citizens

New York State residents 60 years of age or older may audit undergraduate courses at John Jay College on a tuition-free, space-available basis. **There is a 2 course limit per semester.** All Senior Citizen applicants must be New York State residents and must submit verification of age. The following forms of proof of age will be acceptable for admission:

Medicaid Card Driver's License Birth Certificate U.S. Passport

Auditors do not receive grades or academic credit for their courses. Individuals enrolling under this program pay fees totaling \$80 each semester payable upon registration. Along with verification of age and New York State residency, applicants must file the undergraduate non-degree application to be considered for this program. The application fee is not required for senior auditors. However, senior citizens who wish to take courses for degree credit must pay the application fee and will be charged the appropriate tuition.

Measles, Mumps, and Rubella – State Requirements

Public Health law Section 2165 requires proof of immunity to all three diseases for college students born after 1956. Adequate proof of immunity consists of the following:

- **Immunization records showing the dates the student received:**

TWO measles vaccine doses at least 28 days apart; on or after 1st birthday, and dated 1968 or later.*

ONE mumps vaccine dose; on or after 1st birthday and dated 1969 or later.*

ONE rubella vaccine dose; on or after 1st birthday and dated 1969 or later.*

-OR-

TWO combined doses or MMR vaccine doses at least 28 days apart; on or after 1st birthday, and dated 1968 or later.*

A vaccine given before these dates is NOT acceptable unless the record indicated that it was a “live virus” vaccine.

-OR-

- Titer results (blood tests for the presence of antibodies) showing the student is **immune** to measles, mumps, and/or rubella. Please have titer records read by an experienced health office worker.

-OR-

- Disease of measles and/or mumps is documented by a physician’s letter. **The date must be included.** Disease satisfies both #1+2 measles requirements and mumps requirement.

Disease of rubella is NOT an acceptable proof of immunity. There must be proof of vaccine.

Note:

1. Students who document religious or medical factors that prohibit them from being immunized may be granted an exemption or temporary waiver of the immunization requirements.
2. One proof of measles can be provided with a United States education record, such as a diploma, report card, or high school transcript.

ALL RECORDS MUST BE STAMPED AND SIGNED BY A MEDICAL PROVIDER

OR

HAS A SCHOOL/COLLEGE SEAL OR STAMP.
